

1997 Shirtsleeve Conference Held In Annapolis, Maryland - Mu Rho Chapter









Theodore O. Randolph: "Beta 16" Enters Omega Chapter



On October 17, 1997, Brother Theodore O. "Ted, Beta 16" Randolph entered Omega Chapter at the Greater Baltimore Medical Center, Baltimore, Maryland. Brother Randolph, the son of the late Reverend John and Mary Randolph, was born on July 7, 1893 in Burlington, New Jersey. Known fondly as "Ted" to his wife, friends and colleagues, and "Bets 16" to his Omega Brothers, grew up near Philadelphia where her graduated from Darby High School in 1912.

After working for two years he entered Lincoln University, Pennsylvania where he became an

Omega Man in 1916, thus being known as "Beta 16". With the onset of the United States entering World War I in 1917, Brother Randolph entered the U. S. Army and served until 1919, then re-entered Lincoln University from which he graduated in 1921.

Following graduation, he began his career as an educator in several school systems in West Virginia and Maryland, with the majority of his experiences in the Baltimore City System, from which he retired in 1963. During his career he had experience as a teacher, athletic coach and principal. He also took time to earn his Masters and Doctoral degrees from Columbia University.

Brother Randolph was a very devoted Omega Man, who affiliated with Pi Omega Chapter in the 1930's and missed very few Chapter meetings, and was in attendance at this past September's Chapter meeting and missing the October meeting because he was in the hospital. He participated in all Chapter activities and had received numerous awards for his involvement. During achievement week, he has received the Founders Day Award on several occasions and was the recipient of Pi Omega's coveted "Chapter Omega Man of the Year" award in 1974, and in 1996, received the Fraternity 80 Year Award.

In addition to his Fraternity involvement, he was also a Mason, and an active member of the Boy Scouts of America, having received in 1965, "The Silver Beaver" award. Brother Randolph has served as a volunteer from Maryland's League for the Handicapped, where he was named as the Leagues Lifetime Director.. He also found time to swim several times a week in the "Leagues" pool. In addition, he was also a member of the American Legion, and a devoted member of Payne Memorial A.M.E. Church in Baltimore, where he had been an active member for 65 years.

His memories will long live in the hearts of: his devoted wife, Beatrice, loving daughter, R'Gwen, dedicated grandchildren, Morris and Ciarra and a host of other relatives and friends, and especially his Omega Brothers.

WILLIAM ELMO CLAIBORNE REMEMBERED

New York, New York- William Elmo Claiborne entered Omega Chapter on March 24, 1997. Many family members and friends were present for the special Omega Memorial service which was concluded for him by Kappa Omicron members on Thursday, April 3, 1997 at St. James Presbyterian Church in New York City where he had been a member for 46 years.

William Elmo Claiborne was initiated into the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity in 1943 and as recently as 1955 he received "The Distinguished Service Award" from Kappa Omicron Chapter. He was a life member of the fraternity and held numerous offices in Kappa Omicron Chapter during his 47 years as an active member.

He was born on October 28, 1911 in South Boston, Virginia to Paul and Leslie Edmonds Claiborne. He attended Henderson Institute, St. Paul's College and received a B.S. Degree from Kentucky State University in 1943 and a M.S.W. from Fordham University in 1953. He was sergeant in the U.S. Army from 1943 to 1945. During his early years he worked as a counselor at the Wiltwyck School for Boys, a psychiatric social worker at Bellevue Hospital and he worked as a clinical social worker for 17 years at the Bronx Veterans Medical Center until his retirement in 1982. In 1962 he was elected an Elder at St. James Presbyterian Church where he was an active member of the Men's Club, Treasurer of the Benevolent Fund and Moderator of the Capital Improvement Fund.

William was a member of the Urban League, the Southern Poverty Center, the Southern Christian leadership Conference, a life member of the NAACP and a charter member of the New York state Association of Social Workers. He will be remembered with love by his wife Marian, whom he married in 1950, his daughter, Fern Brown; a sister, N. Irene Wilbourn; a nephew, William Mckinley; a niece, Leslie Sabrina Jones; a grand niece, Asia Means; a great grand nephew, Rayshawn Chisholm; many cousins and a host of relatives and friends.

William Claiborne and his wife Marian will long be remembered for their outstanding and dedicated service to Kappa Omicron Chapter. His wife Marian was the president of the K.O. Quettes for many years and organized many social and cultural events for the chapter. William Elmo Claiborne was loved and respected by his fraternity brothers, his friends and his family and truly will be missed and not forgotten.

He entered the Baltimore City School System as a teacher of mentally deficient students, but soon after was drafted into the U.S. Army during World War II. He reached the rank of Technical Sergeant while serving in a Quartermaster Unit, with service in Germany until the end of the war in Europe.

Brother "Mac", as he was called, resumed his teaching career after being discharged. He soon reentered the Baltimore School System, and also continued his education at the then, Morgan State College. He continued his career as a teacher and department head of Social Studies, where many still have fond memories of him as a strict, excellent, and devoted teacher. He retired after 40 years of dedicated service.

Brother Chamberlain was initiated into Omega in 1956 through Pi Omega Chapter, where he continued to serve until the end. He loved to cook, work with plants and go fishing.

He left to mourn two sisters, Lillian and Annie, and a host of other relatives and friends.





Step Show performed at half time of William Lunsford Benefit Basketball Game










Brothers get an opportunity to talk with a legend - Bro. Ted Randolph (Beta 16) before his recent departing into Omega Chapter



"On Friday evening, November 17, 1911, three students present at the former meeting with Professor Just met for a further consideration of the matter of the fraternity. At this meeting, the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity was decided upon, also the motto and the cardinal principles upon which the fraternity was founded. The design for the pin and Escutcheon were also decide upon.

On that night, November 17, 1911, sacred to all Omega men, the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity was born. The four cardinal principles agreed upon at the meeting were manhood, scholarship, perseverance, and uplift. The motto, "Friendship is essential to the soul" was symbolized by the Greek letters that fully express the motto" (Dreer, 1940).

Greetings My Brothers and Happy 86th Birthday!

At this time each year it is right that we as Omega men pause to give thought on our institution the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Eighty-six years of service and leadership to the community is possible only through the ingenuity of real men over the years dedicated to solid principles. We will be forever indebted to the scholarship of the founders, and the nobility in their characters, as they laid a solid foundation upon which we are able to proudly proclaim Omega as our own.

The legacy of Omega is one of respect; it is clear and without contradiction. Our history reads, in many ways, like the history of accomplishments by Black Americans to the United States. Because we had nerve, and because we assumed roles of leadership in the community, Omega men were always at the forefront of important social justice issues. In 1997 we need to continue this tradition of leadership and further commit ourselves to new challenges which lay ahead.

As we consider this fraternal year and the impending millennium change, there remains much in need within the Black community. We should always remember the needs of our youth. It is our duty to help them through mentorship and opportunities to create bright futures. We must use our collective ingenuity and resources to network effectively to improve the economic conditions of our people, thereby humanizing the entire spectrum of peoples around the world. We must also endeavor to rekindle the industry, as well as, the spirit of the founder's principles of Omega, that we might begin to reach the level of these and other aspirations.

Finally my brothers, if you are reminded of nothing else this month, remember the value of perseverance. Eighty six years is a long time. Omega teaches us that through intelligent perseverance we can change the course of history and make all things wrong, right. Perseverance also reminds us to never, ever, ever give up; not on your cause, on your mission, nor on the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. The Fraternity and its legacy belongs to all of us, please continue to do your part to advance us into the year 2000. May the Supreme Basileus bless your endeavors as you celebrate. *Long Live The Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.!*


Beta Chapter Sets The Undergraduate Pace



Mu Omega Cruises The Delaware


